It also offers assistance to high-quality home and center-based childcare programs and the childcare workforce. Services include free Pre-K, home visits, parent education, resource navigation, support for parenting students, premium pay for family support staff, and high-intensity tutoring. Youth Opportunity Programs	This project supports summer youth employment programs in Chicago that have been proven to reduce involvement in the criminal justice system. The Youth Jobs program includes funding for three programs under One Summer Chicago: Chicagobility for youth ages 14-15, Summer Youth Employment Program for youth ages 16-24, and Chicago Youth Service Corps for youth ages 16-24. The programs provide project-based learning, job placement, training, skill-building experiences, leadership development, and civic engagement opportunities. Contracts were awarded to 57 delegate agencies from April 2022 to December 2023, with the possibility of an extension. 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Legal Representation for Tenant Eviction	This project provides legal support for tenants facing eviction. Multiple rigorous impact evaluations have found this intervention reduces evictions. Per Connecticut Public Act 21-34 ("Act"), which established the Right to Counsel Program, effective July 1, 2021, free legal representation will be provided to income-eligible tenants and occupants in residential eviction and administrative proceedings. Individuals with household incomes that are no more than 80% of the state's median income or who receive certain types of public assistance are considered income eligible. Universal Home Visiting	The Universal Home Visiting Program will pilot the evidence-based Family Connects model, pairing new mothers with registered nurses for up to 3 home visits. The nurses will assess needs, share knowledge, and assist families in accessing community programs and resources. Home visiting has demonstrated positive impacts on mental and physical health outcomes, preventing child maltreatment and reducing emergency medical care use by 50% in infants and clinical anxiety in mothers by 28%. Summer Youth Employment	The Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP) fills a need across Detroit to provide youth and young adults with career-oriented information, training, and experience by improving the local employment pipeline and connecting youth to permanent, high-paying positions. This project supports summer youth employment programming, which multiple rigorous impact evaluations have found to reduce involvement in the criminal justice system. The Idaho Department of Health and Welfare (DHW) was awarded \$1,000,000 for a three-year period by the Office of the Governor and the Division of Financial Management to address the COVID-19 impact on Idaho's vulnerable families through the implementation of Evidence Based Home Visiting (EBHV) programs. Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Sun Coast, Inc	This project supports Big Brothers Big Sisters (BBBS), a program that matches mentors with children for positive impact. Rigorous evaluations show improved academic achievement from this model. The Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Sun Coast, Extended Learning and After-School Project will expand services in Lee County through the One to One Mentoring Program. This program addresses educational disparities by providing advocacy, guidance, support, and resources to overcome barriers and achieve academic and life success. Positive outcomes include improved school attendance, academic progress, avoidance of risky behaviors, high school graduation, and pursuit of higher education. With a team of 12 housing law specialists, RTCM ensures all families facing eviction have dedicated attorneys to negotiate disputes, access support services, and provide courtroom advocacy. By leveling the playing field in court, RTCM reduces unnecessary proceedings and associated public costs. Education Partnership Program	The project allocates funding of up to \$200,000 to support the evidence-based Reach Out and Read model, where doctors and medical professionals integrate literacy support during well-child visits. This model has demonstrated improved language development outcomes. Additionally, the Education Partnerships Coalition, consisting of eight Minnesota communities, aims to close opportunity gaps and enhance educational outcomes for children and families in economically disadvantaged areas. The project seeks to establish a comprehensive network of evidence-based support services, addressing poverty-related challenges and fostering economic viability within these communities. Clubhouses	This project supports psychiatric rehabilitation through the ICCD Clubhouse Model, known for its positive impact on employment outcomes. The goal is to expand NYC's Clubhouse membership by 25% and offer 750 more adults a community for meaningful daytime activities. 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Eviction Legal Defense	This project provides legal and financial assistance for low income tenants facing eviction. Multiple rigorous impact evaluations have found legal support for such tenants reduces evictions. Support includes legal defense services and associated financial settlement assistance for renters experiencing an eviction or potential eviction. Primary partners include the City/County Joint Office of Homeless Services, Multnomah County Youth and Family Services, legal service providers, and other culturally specific and community-based organizations. This project supports specialized, treatment-oriented, problem-solving courts that divert individuals with mental illness away from the criminal justice system and into court-mandated, community-based treatment programs. Tenant Legal Services	This project provides legal support for tenants facing eviction. 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Right Track	This project supports summer youth employment programming, which multiple rigorous impact evaluations have found to reduce involvement in the criminal justice system. Funds support the expansion of the Parks and Recreation Right Track Plus young adult workforce training and internship program. The program is a collaborative effort working with nonprofits, public, and private sectors to connect young people with meaningful internships. The investment allowed the program to expand the age range of youth served, and extend internships beyond the typical summer season. Expanding this program addresses youth unemployment and the job training provides career advancement and high wage opportunities. LevelUp Tulsa	The project allocates funding of up to \$34,107 to support participation in career training from Tulsa Community WorkAdvance. A rigorous impact evaluation found that this model increases earned income. LevelUp Tulsa specifically enables program growth by providing stipends to WorkAdvance participants to alleviate financial barriers to access by supplementing needed income which may be lost by taking time off from work to attend a training. These parents are supported to and through job placement, with many immediately entering new jobs making at least \$2-4/hr more than they were before becoming a LevelUp participant. 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High Impact Tutoring	This project will deliver high-impact and frequency tutoring programs, across all schools. The primary objective of this intervention is to mitigate the learning loss caused by remote learning during the pandemic. The program specifically targets students who are academically behind and at risk of not graduating high school with the essential college and career readiness knowledge and skills. The high dosage tutoring intervention will be evidence based, as determined by the evidence tiers defined in the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). This ensures that the program's strategies and approaches align with research-backed methods that have proven to improve outcomes for students.
